

Strong, Prosperous, And Resilient Communities Challenge

We all benefit when everyone thrives.

Over the next decade, trillions of dollars of public and private sector funding will fuel new investments in infrastructure, transit, housing, health, and preparing for the challenges of climate change. In the past, local and regional infrastructure investments have been made in ways that divided neighborhoods and limited opportunities for people of color and low-income communities. Look at the data on health outcomes, employment, and economic and other risk factors: *Your ZIP code says a lot about your opportunity.*

In this critical moment, the way we build the places we live, work, and play should benefit everyone. As local leaders, community members, policymakers, and others determine how the next big wave of investments will be spent in their area, the **Strong, Prosperous, And Resilient Communities Challenge**, or SPARCC, is supporting local efforts to make sure the investments are used to make their communities places where everyone thrives.

SPARCC is empowering communities.

SPARCC is a three-year, \$90 million initiative to amplify locally driven efforts to ensure that major new infrastructure investments lead to equitable and healthy opportunities for everyone. SPARCC is investing in the ideas, energy, and momentum of local networks to positively shape our cities and regions for generations.

SPARCC is an initiative of Enterprise Community Partners, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, the Low Income Investment Fund, and the Natural Resources Defense Council, with funding support from the Ford Foundation, The JPB Foundation, The Kresge Foundation, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and The California Endowment.

Who is participating?

In February 2017, following a competitive application process, SPARCC announced the selection of six initial sites:

- Atlanta
- Chicago
- Denver

- Los Angeles
- Memphis
- San Francisco Bay Area

These localities will each receive \$1 million in combined grant and technical assistance funds over the next three years to support their local efforts. Collectively, the SPARCC sites will have access to an estimated pool of \$70 million in financing capital, as well as \$14 million in additional programmatic support.

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In each region, the SPARCC work will be led by multidisciplinary groups who are bringing together community residents, the public and private sectors, and local government to make sure that all residents have a voice in ensuring new infrastructure investments benefit everyone. While each SPARCC site is different, all six have proposed concrete strategies to make their communities more prosperous and equitable through solutions ranging from shaping regional transit expansion and revitalizing existing transit hubs, to reshaping and redirecting housing and land use.

Long term, SPARCC's goal is for other cities, communities, and regions to adopt similar approaches to achieving more just economic, health, and environmental outcomes, using the success of the first six SPARCC sites as a model.

Why now?

Big infrastructure investments are coming or are already underway, and people of all races and incomes should benefit. At the national level, it has been estimated that we need to invest \$3.6 trillion on infrastructure by 2020.

Across the country, communities are making bold investments in 21st century infrastructure.

- In cities like Atlanta, Denver, and Los Angeles, major public transportation systems expansions are
 planned to better connect housing to jobs, ensure equitable development, and help reduce harmful
 pollution from an over-dependence on private transportation. In Chicago, local groups are investing
 in revitalizing communities near existing transit hubs.
- In the San Francisco Bay Area, significant funds have been dedicated to building and preserving affordable housing to help combat displacement.
- In Memphis, funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development is supporting the "Greenprint" project a regional initiative to connect hundreds of miles of greenway trails, open space, and infrastructure development over the next 25 years.

San Francisco Bay Area

Bay Area for All (BA4A) is aligning the work, vision, and focus of three nationally recognized collaboratives to build an equitable, healthy, climate-wise Bay Area.
